

APACHE TEARS MINE

KAP WR 12/6/85: While on the Dec 5, 1985 Forest Service field trip, we visited the Apache Tears Caves operated by Guzman Construction. The gemstone collecting site is opened every day of the year except Christmas. The charge is currently \$2.00 to collect a 1 gallon bucket of tears. The Apache Tears can also be purchased at the little rockshop at the site. The local Forest Service District Ranger has contended for years that the rockshop and collecting fee collecting site are not legal uses of a mining claim, but it has remained intact as a long time Arizona rockhound tradition.

Apache l'ears

Apache tears are obsidian, a clear volcanic glass, known since before the time of Christ. Polished Apache tears are used in jewelry. and very large stones are prized as paperweights.

The Apache Tears Mine is open seven days a week during daylight hours. It is located between Superior and the Boyce Thompson Arboretum, just off Highway 60. There are two roads in, both well marked, about one and one half miles west of Superior.

THIS IS A FEE AREA. For one dollar, you may fill a small buckett with tears. Smaller stones may be picked from the rubble on the ground. More ambitious miners are advised to bring their own hammer and chisel or sturdy screwdriver to dig the tears out of the soft volcanic rock. Because this area is in the desert, digging can be hot work, so it is reccommended that visitors wear a wide-brimmed hat and bring plenty of drinking water. Two shaded picnic tables have been provided at the site.
