


Friday, October 10 - Received call from individual who was investigating the Senator-Cash mine for client who was a potential investor. John O. Bruer of the Bruer Company, Box 263, Geneva, Illinois had contacted client to invest in the Bruer Co. to purchase mining equipment to bring the Senator-Cash mine into production. The caller's investigation turned from the mining property on which only limited information was available to John O. Bruer. The private investigator explained that as best as could be determined Bruer Co. sells mail order orthopedic devices. Over the last eight to ten years, John Bruer formed a variety of companies, none of which quite did anything and has been through a number of financial difficulties. Initially there was an Ill. Valley Mfg. Co. in Peru, Illinois, which was declared bankrupt in 1959 and apparently never did any work. Bruer declared personal bankruptcy in 1960. He was involved in promoting hybird grain and a wheat-barley cross. He and an Art Nitsche were partners in an Orland Development Co. which was involved in a Circuit Court, Cook City, Illinois, 1967 judgement of default on two notes

(\$150,000 and \$61,000). In May of 1968, he was subjected to a Federal ax Lien #20847507 for \$8,000. Bruer has been involved in two additional civil matters, one with an Ark-Tex Mining Company and the other with a Lancer Oil Co. All of the above mentioned matters were received by an unidentified source and should not be considered fact until official copies are received by the Department as promised by the investigator.


KAP WR \$\int_6/80: A report was received from a usually reliable source that John Bruer holds or has held a lease on the Senator-Cash Mine, Hassayampa District, Yavapai County. The mine is reported to be owned by a Mr. Orr. John Bruer is reported to have received a Cease and Desist Order for selling unregistered securities.

MG WR 10/18/85: An inquiry from a stock broker in Tulsa, Oklahoma, indicates that a property package comprising the Senator and Cash mine (Yavapai County) is being sold to investors. The prospectus reportedly states there is a reserve of approximately 1,100,000 tos of +0.3 oz gold/ton.

RRB WR 10/31/86: Assisted Jim Mott of the Mine Inspector's office. Residents near the Cash Mine (f) Yavapai County have been using one of the old shafts or stopes for a garbage dump and it caught on fire. No they don't like the smoke.

Old Dick

It has been reliably reported to me that the Mudd interests, either the Coronado or the Cyprus Companies, have exercised their option and will take over the Old Dick early in May.

Black Pearl

Scholz and Cazier have started exploration work for which they were granted a loan, I think the amount is \$125,000. This work will consist of a shaft 150 ft. deep to be sunk near the portal of the present adit, and 400 ft. of drifting from the bottom of the shaft.

Bagdad Copper

A new 9 yd. P. & H. electric shovel together with a fleet of large Dart trucks have just been put in operation stripping the hill to the northwest of the present pit. This work will uncover an extensive area of known ore.

Cash Mine

Owned and operated by Orr and Dickie is now shipping ore to the Poarch Plant at Humboldt for treatment when the plant is put in operation. The ore carries values in gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc.

OWNERSHIP & LOCATION

Owned by J. B. McMasters, Groom Creek Route, Prescott. now under lease and option to Jack Orr, Iron Springs Road, Prescott, and E. R. Dickie, Bagdad, present operators. Located 13 miles south of Prescott on the Senator Hiway. It consists of 3 Patented Mining Claims. Jack Orr is in charge of the work.

HISTORY

It was operated first between 1900 and 1915, later on by intermittent leasees. The early operators sunk two shafts to a depth of 400 ft. and did extensive drifting, a mill was built and a considerable tonnage was mined and milled. Near the surface the principal values were in gold, solver and lead. High grade gold values were common. At deeper levels copper and zinc came into the ore and the gold and lead values decreased. There is no available record of the overall production. Toward the end of the early operation a connection was made with the Senator tunnel with a drift into the Cash ground and a raise to the existing 400° level of the Cash. This drained the Cash mine and afforded ventilation for both mines. This connecting drift is the 600% of the Cash mine. At that time considerable drifting was done on this level and several lenses of gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc ore were exposed. None was stoped.

PRESENT OPERATIONS

After the Senator Tunnell had been reopened in 1950 present operators started work on the 600' level. Stoping of ore then exposed was commenced and has been continued ever since. Several hundred ft. of additional drifting has been done opening up two more small shoots of ore. All of the lenses of ore so far encountered are small and irregular resulting in slow and expensive mining.

PRODUCTION

It is reported that in recent operations about 800 tons of one has been shipped, most-to the Iron King Mill, with an average value of around gold .3% silver 10oz. Lead 7% Zinc 8% Copper 1%. The rate of production at present is about 150 tons per month. Mr. Orr states that he plans to gain access to the old 3rd, and 4th, levels in which are reported to be considerable ore left by former operators due to milling difficulties.

EQUIPMENT

The property is well equipped with Compressor, rock drills, mucking machine and other tools. Two mules with strings of 87 ton cars each are used for the tramming. The longest tramming distance is about 4000 ft. Surface improvements at the portal of the Senator tunnel consist of a shop and store room, change room and adequate ore bins.

COMMENTS

While it has shown no profit as yet it is now paying its way and there is a chance of some bigger and better orebodies men found. 7 men are at present employed.

CASH MINE

The Cash was rather a well known gold mine during the early days of the northern Bradshaw activity. It is said to have had a considerable, but unknown, gold-silver production, coming largely from the oxidized zone. The mine has been dormant and inaccessible for many years. With the reopening of the Senator Tunnel early in 1950 one of the Cash veins became accessible.

During the first six months of this year (1950) the above lessees produced 226 tons of ore from a narrow ore shoot which was exposed along the back of an old drift. The average metal content of this ore was 0.20 ozs gold; 8.4 ozs silver; 16.0 % lead; 7.1 % zinc and 2.0 % copper.

Work was suspended in June 1950, owing to the metal prices existing at that time, when net mill returns (Iron King) were \$28.16 per ton on above ore. Today the same ore would net the shipper at the mill \$39.52 or \$11.36 per ton more at present metal prices.

Ore of similar grade to that formely mined is in sight and it appears reasonable that further development and exploration could expose a worth while tonnage of lead, zinc and copper. The lessees are in need of financial aid, in order to carry out such a program.
