Work: Considerable bulldozer work. Located old tunnel filled with top soil - judge at least 50 ft. long.

Geology: These lie in a shear zone in monzonite (or andesite (?) ). Pinta said that the geologist called this monzonite. It also looks like an andesite. A general sample between the face and the portal indicated values in lead, zinc, silver and strontium ( spectographic analysis by Specto-Chemical Laboratory, 2558 Overland Ave., Los Angeles, California). Pinta said that he now planned to reopen and sample the old tunnel. Manganese ran 21%.

Geology: According to Pinta the new tunnel encountered stringers and small pockets that carry free gold. These lie in a shear zone in monzonite (or andesite (?)). (Pinta said that the geologist called this monzonite.) It also looks like an andesite. The stringers were apparently converging at the adit face. A pair of samples across the face ran \$3.70 and \$2.80 in gold. A general sample, between the face and the portal indicated values in lead, zinc, silver and strontium (spectrographic analysis by Spectro-Chemical Laboratory, 2558 Overland Ave., Los Angeles 64, California). Pinta said that he now planned to reopen and sample the old tunnel.
