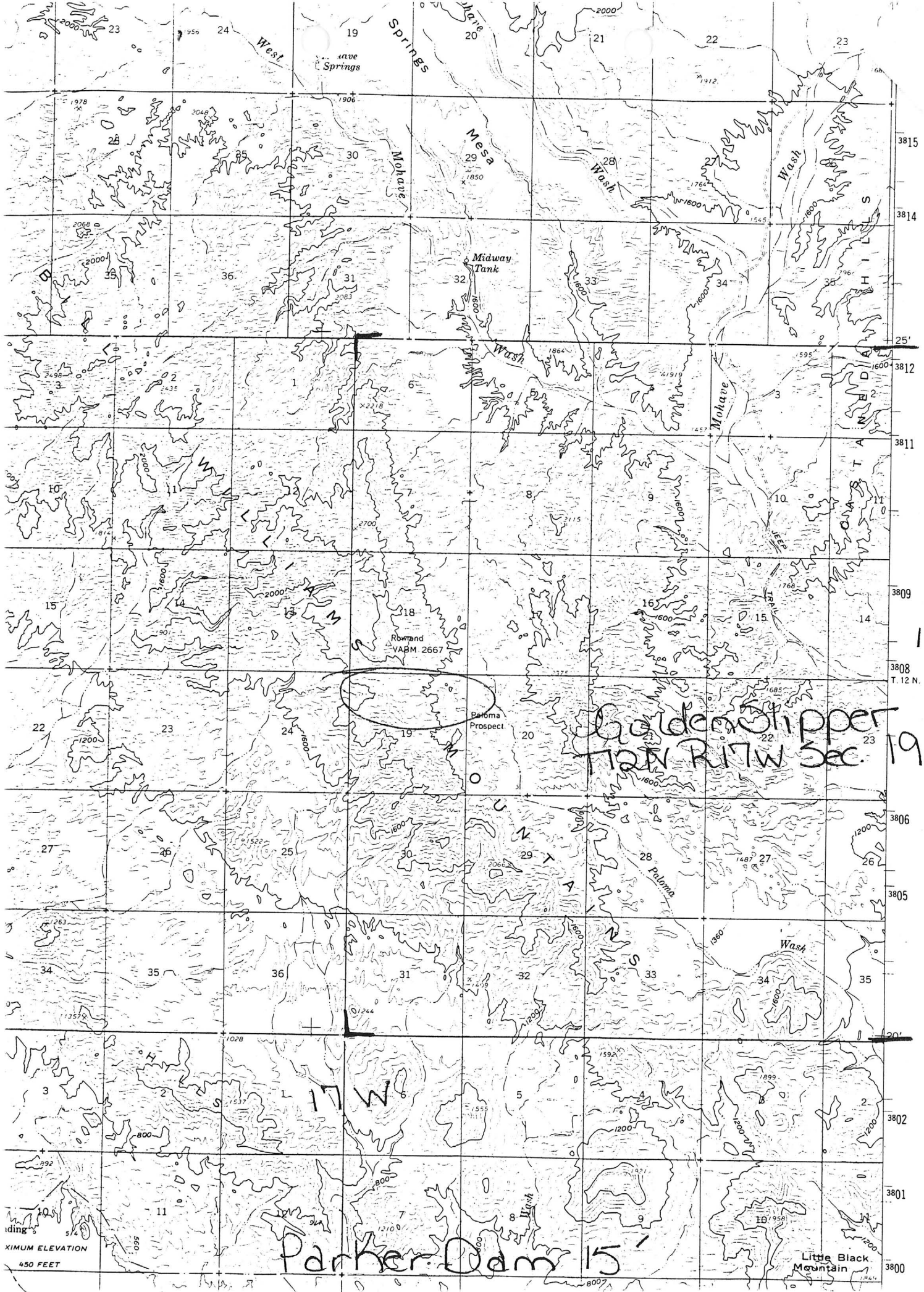

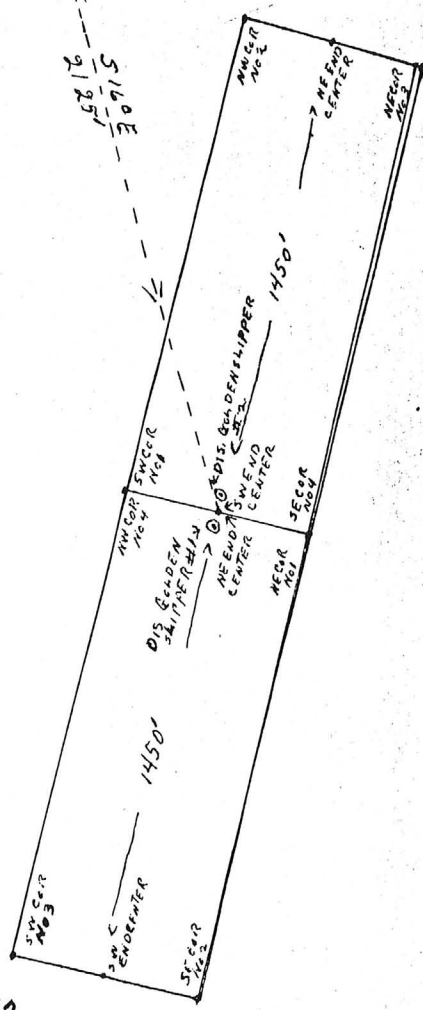

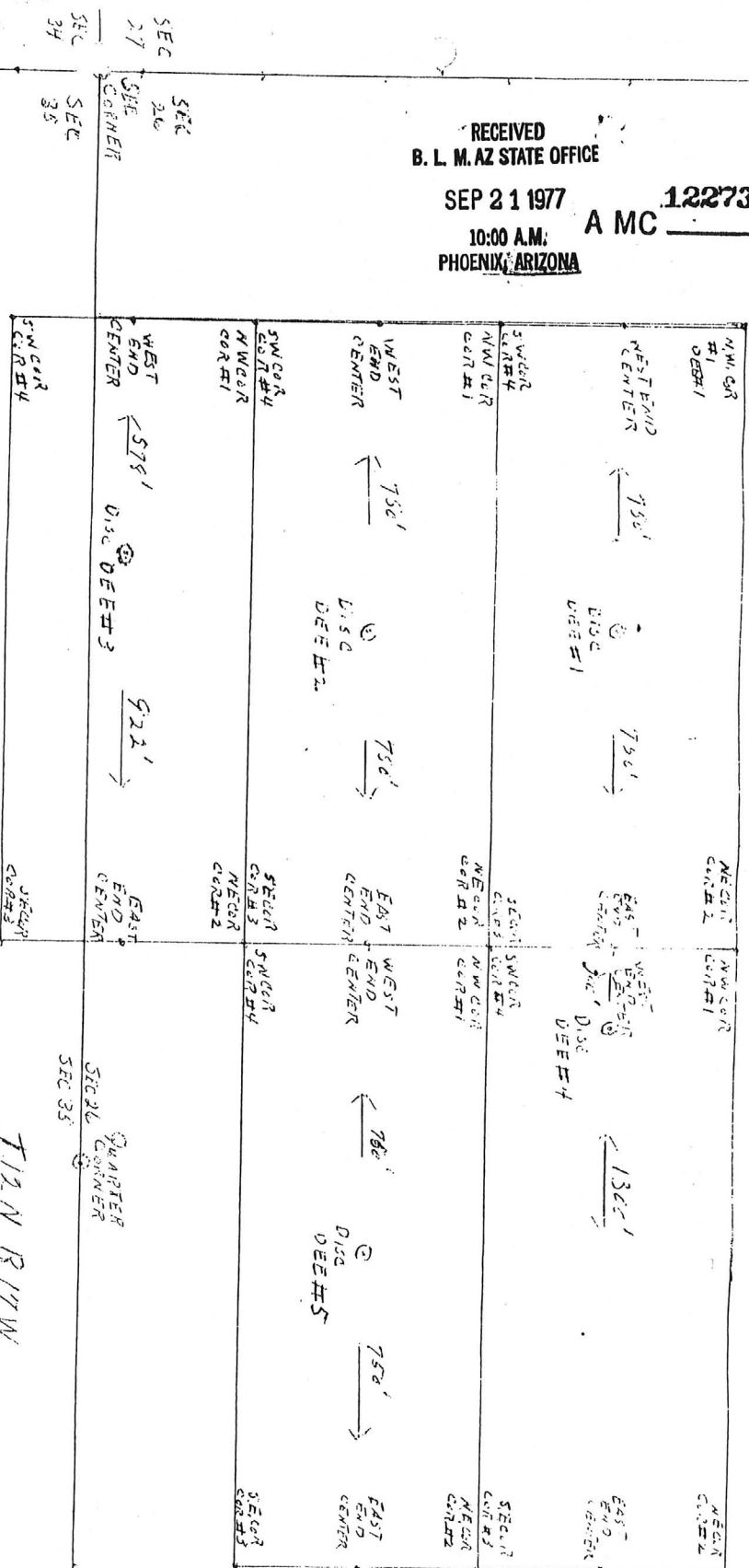

Claims are in Section 19, T12N, R17W, Mohave County, and are contained in the Parker Dam 15' Quadrangle. Access is from Yucca on the west or Wickiup on the east by fair secondary dirt roads. The key is to get to "Ice Box Corner" which is the only road intersection shown in Section 27, T15N, R15W. There is an old abandoned ice box at this corner. Proceed southwest 21 miles to an intersection marked with signs "C. and S." and "Arendell". Turn west for 4.5 miles to C. and S. Camp, which consists of a cabin and camp trailer and is maintained by Kenneth Skelley, 2008 East Laguna Drive, Tempe, Arizona 85282, phone 838-0330 and Wes Collins of Bouse, Arizona, who are partners. They hold 14 unpatented lode claims in the area, five of which are the contiguous Golden Slipper claims. These claims are about six road miles northwest of C. and S. Camp. The roads are passable in a passenger car in dry weather, but probably not in wet because of numerous wash crossings. Relief is moderate.

In the company of Messrs. Collins, Skelley, and his brother Keith of Atlanta, Georgia, a cut on one of the Golden Slipper claims was examined and sampled. A strong 6-1/2 ft. vein in an older precambrian granite gneiss country rock was exposed in the cut. The vein has a strike at S15°E and dips 53° west. It has an observed strike length of several thousand feet according to Mr. Skelley. From footwall to hanging-wall, the vein contained: 6" of a green, clayey, fault gouge; 3 ft. of greenstone; (chlorite, olivine or serpentine ?) and 3' of fractured quartz. The contact between the greenstone and quartz is very sharp as is the contact between the quartz and the country rock on the hangingwall.

Four channel samples were cut. One each across the gouge, greenstone and quartz members and one in the extreme footwall of the quartz member where it contacts the greenstone. According to Mr. Collins, this is a zone of high grade silver (11 tr.oz./ton). The samples will be assayed for Au and Ag at the Iron King Assay Office. The results will govern the next stage of development. If favorable, an adit will be driven on structure on a slight decline to provide an adequate back. Mucking will be done with a small front end loader.

It was recommended that in addition to breast sampling of individual vein components after each round or two, that channel samples be cut at regular intervals along the strike of the outcrop. Mr. Skelley will report the initial assays when obtained.

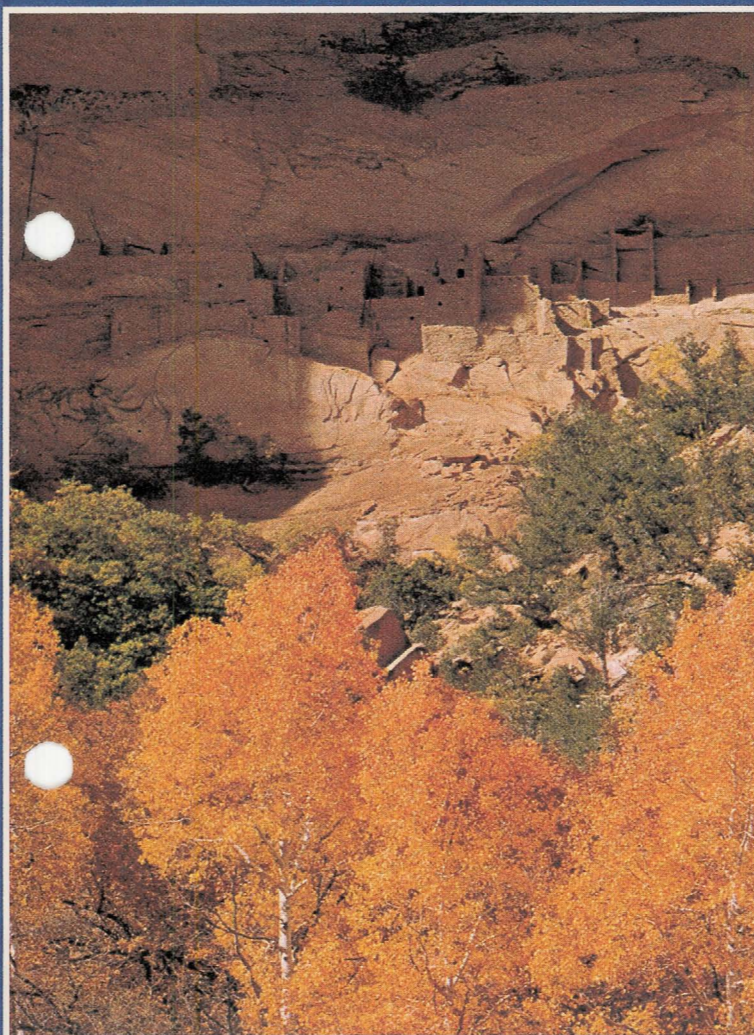

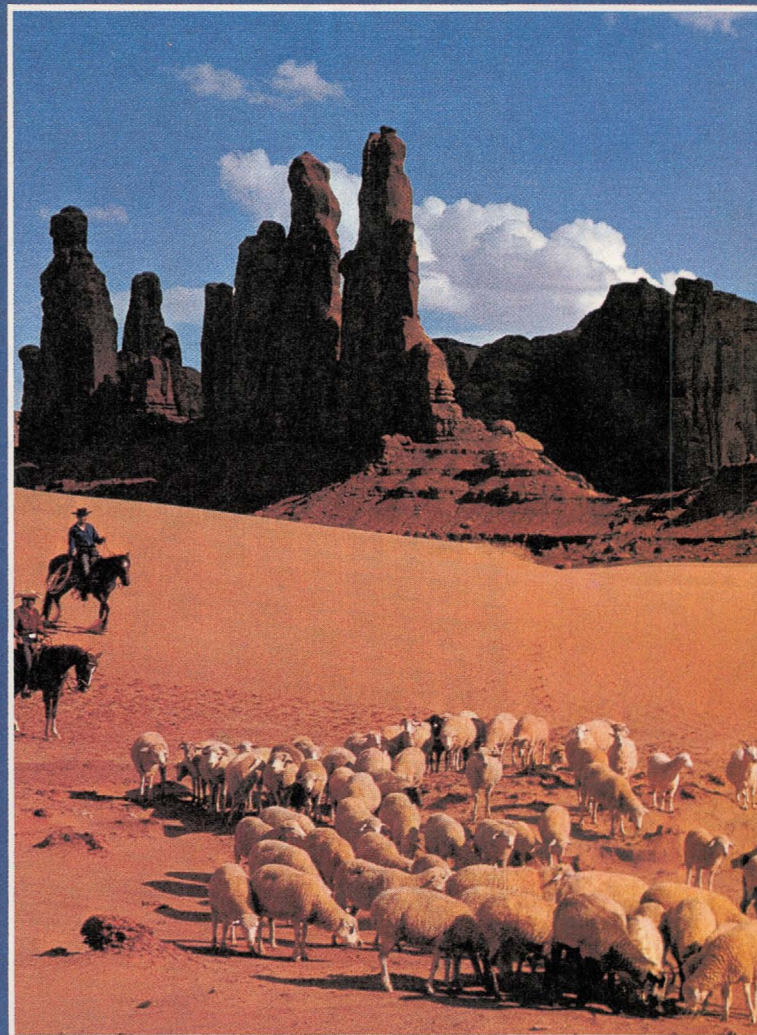

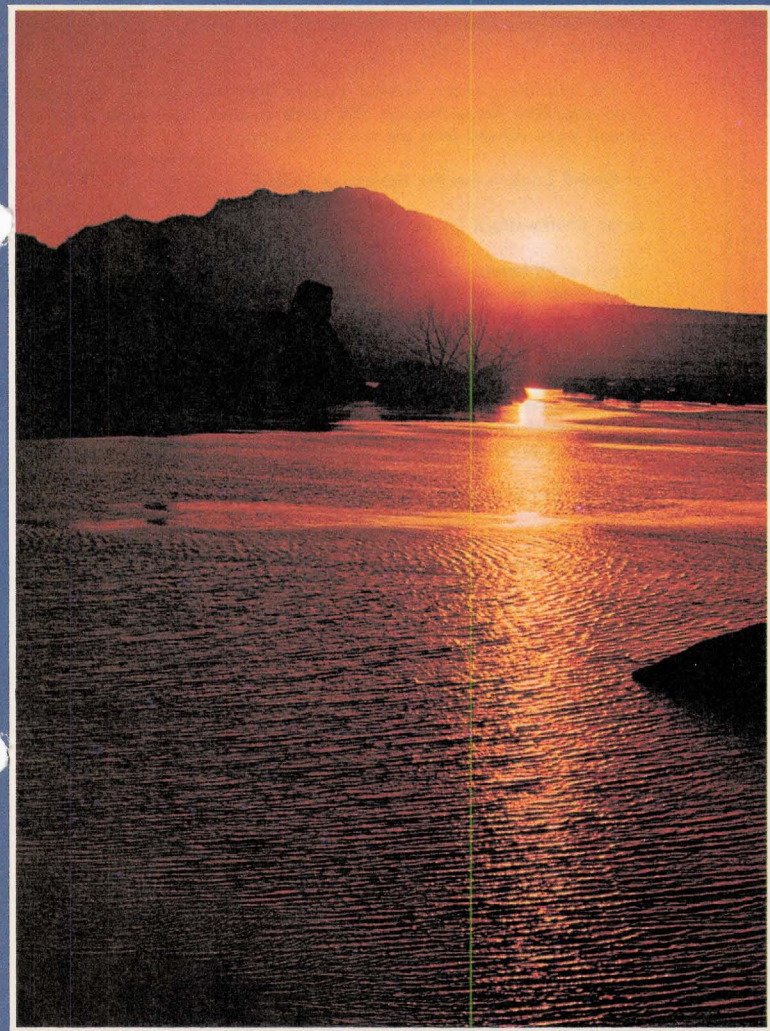

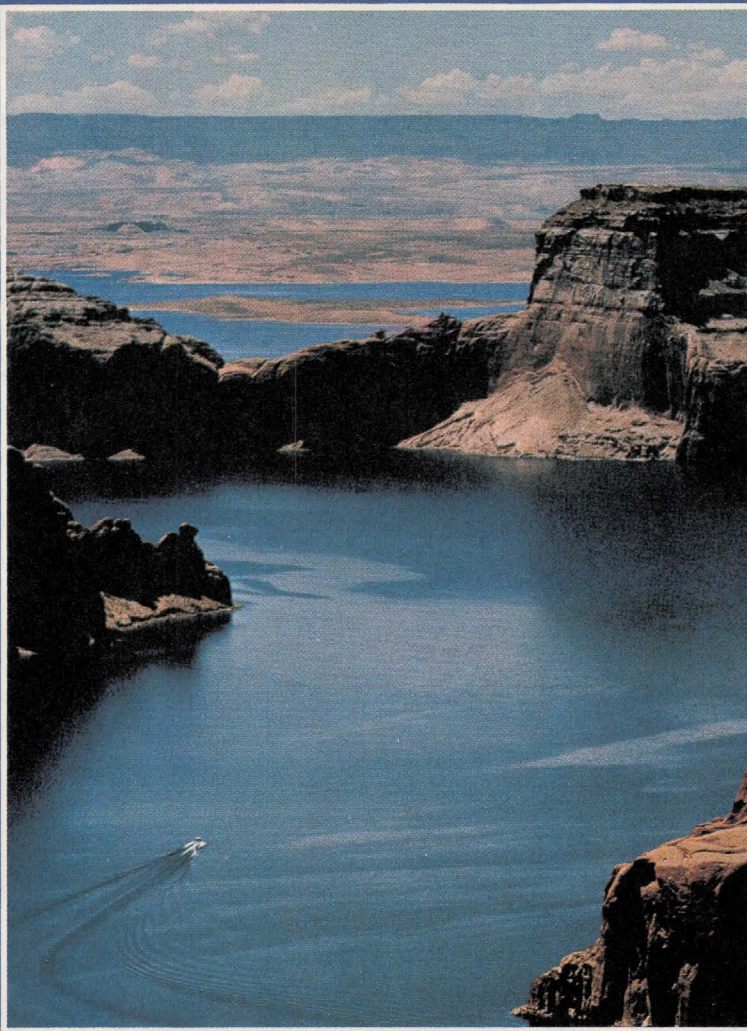

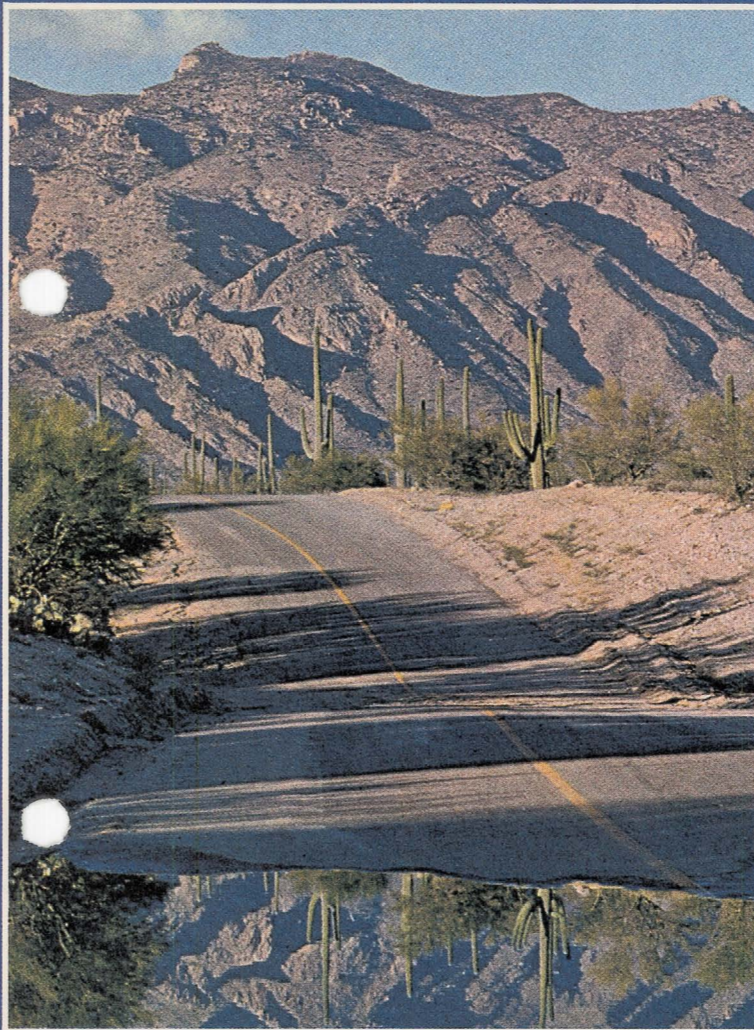

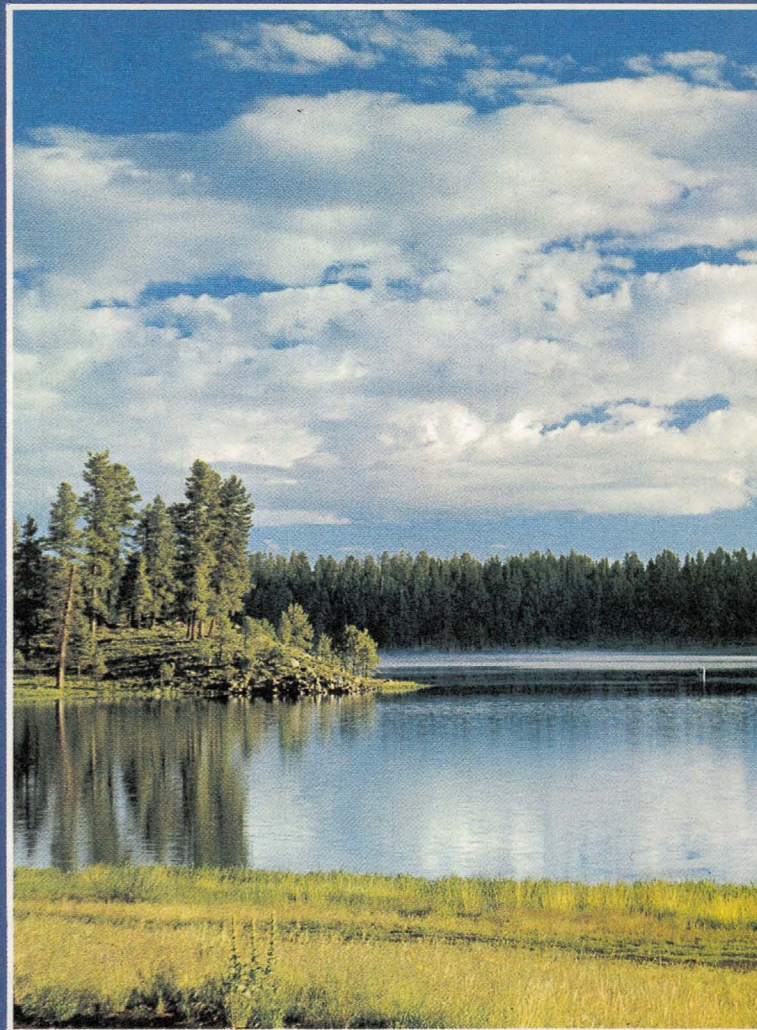

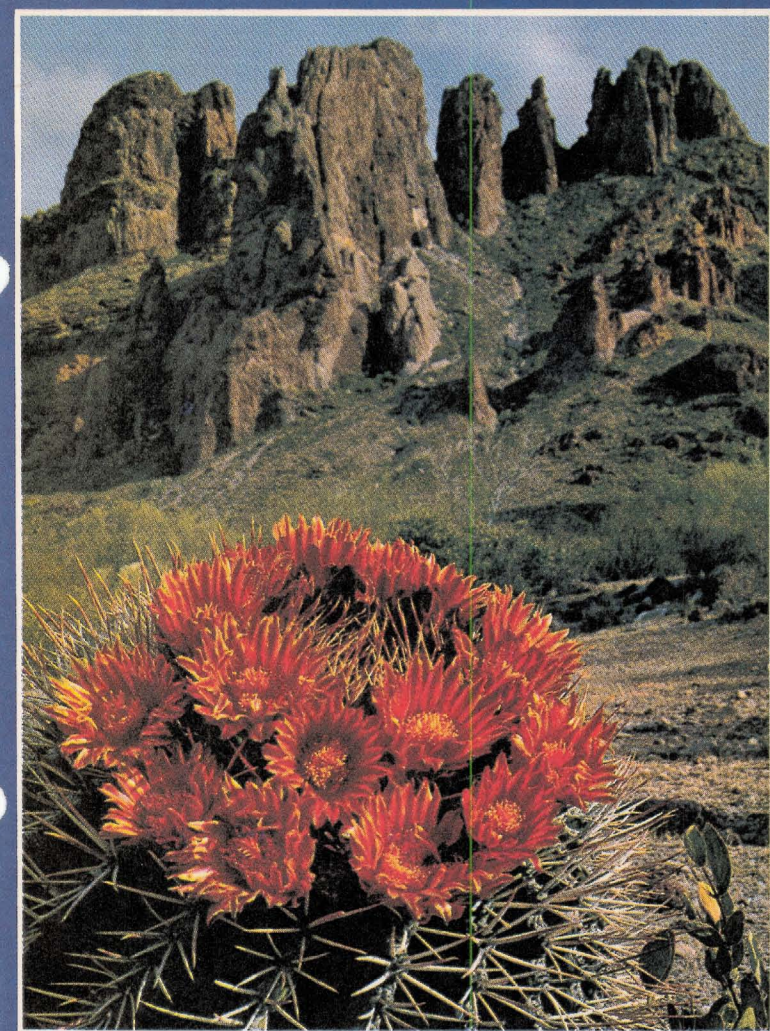

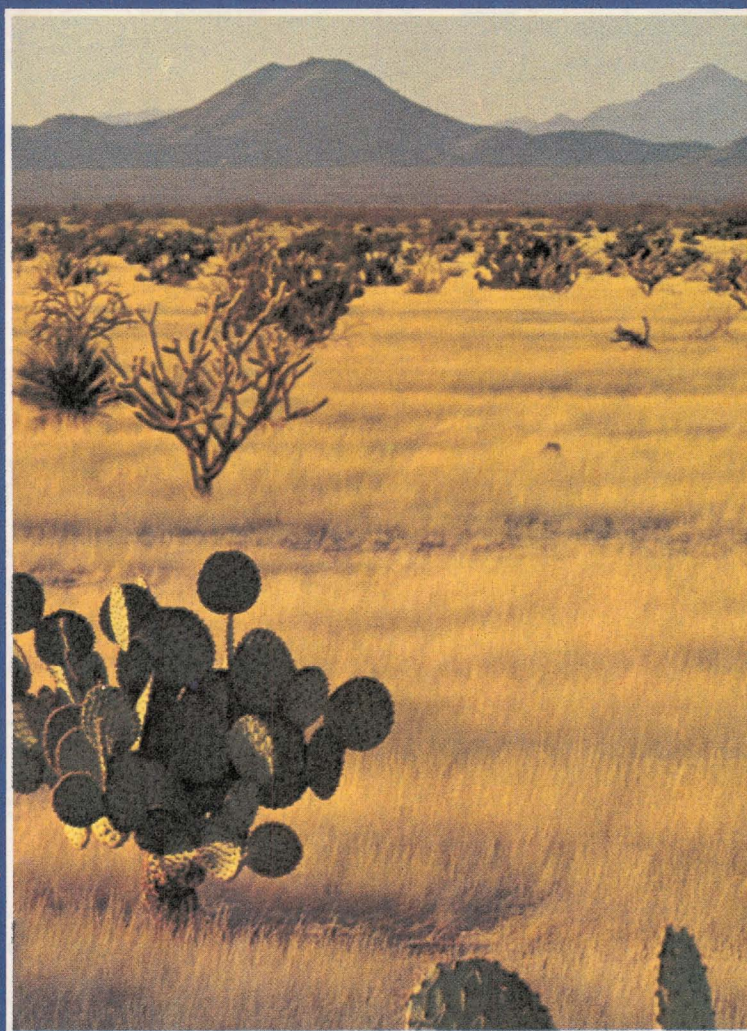

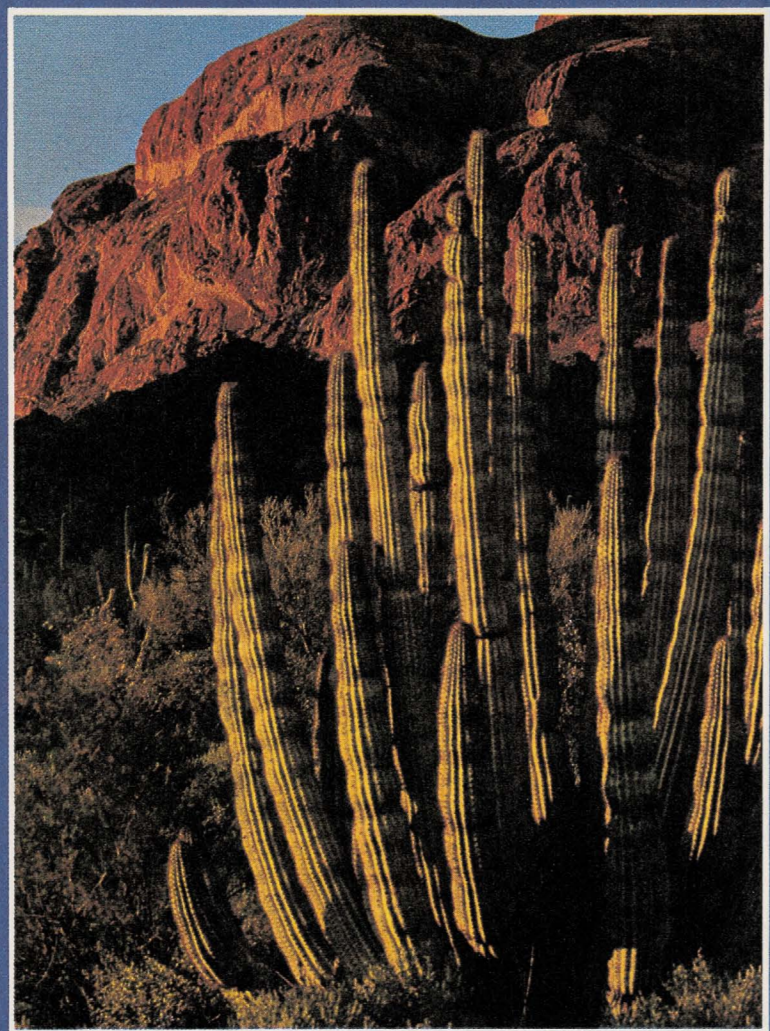

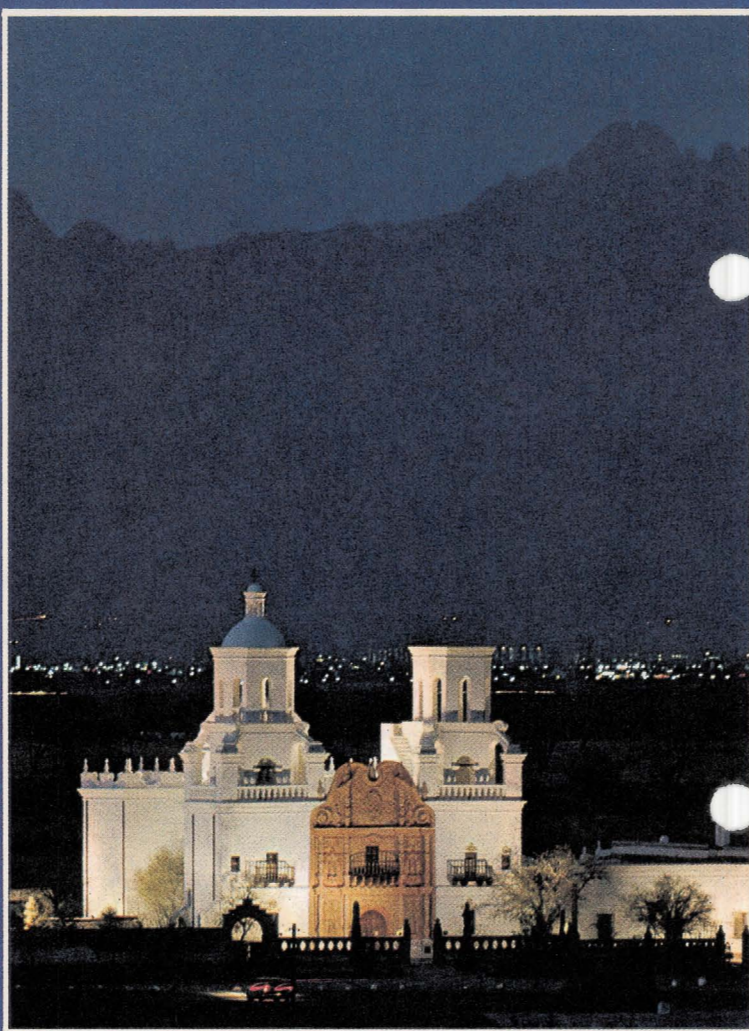

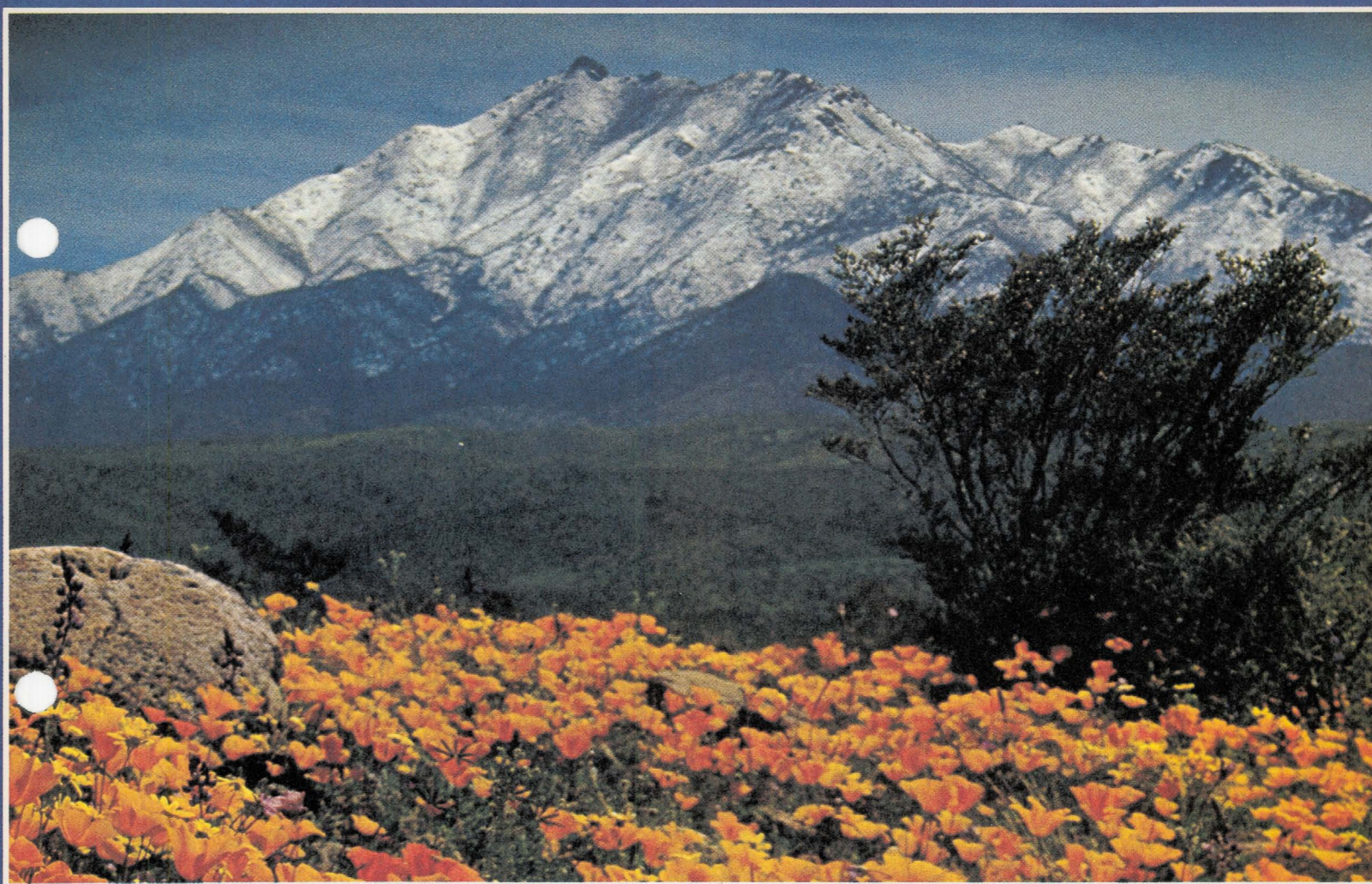

## ARIZONA SYMBOLS OF STATE HOOD

**STATE FLOWER**




The state flower is the blossom of the yellow palo verde cactus, the largest cactus found in the United States. (Cylindropuntia schottii), or Giant cholla, generally in April or May, depending on elevation. It is a very hardy cactus, growing to a height of from forty to fifty feet. - 1. 3. ANAHO LAKE STATE PARK - A 4,000-acre park featuring a 300-acre fishing and water sports lake.
2. 4. SAGEBRUSH TRAIL - Beginning at Apache Junction, 34 miles east of Phoenix, this world-famous trail winds through gorgeous mountain scenery to Globe.
3. 5. ARIZONA SCENIC DESERT MUSEUM - This museum located in Tucson contains 16 miles of scenic desert exhibits of desert history, geology, and anthropology.
4. 6. CANYON DE CHELLY NATIONAL MONUMENT - Near the New Mexico border, this monument preserves the prehistoric ruins of a four-story pueblo community.
5. 7. GRAND CANYON NATIONAL MONUMENT - The well-preserved ruins of a four-story pueblo community dwelling near Coalinga, with remains of an extensive canal system.
6. 8. CHIRICAHUA NATIONAL MONUMENT - Nature has fashioned a weird and silent community through the erosive agency of wind and water.
7. 9. GLEN CANYON NATIONAL MONUMENT AND PARK - The world's greatest natural wonder, the Colorado River flows through this great canyon, appearing a mere thread when viewed from the rim to mile above.
8. 10. HAVASUPAI INDIAN RESERVATION - In this remote part of Grand Canyon lies the Havasupai Indians.
9. 11. HOOPER DAM - Located 72 miles north of Kingman, the largest of all federal reclamation projects and one of the greatest feats of all time.
