

Applicant _____ owns 3 unpatented claims covering 3600' along vein. Mineralization consists of Fe-Cu sulphides along edge of a porphyry dike. This has been explored at various places. Principal work was 2 drifts totalling about 80' driven at different levels with a winze sunk from one of them. This work exposed the vein about 40' vertically & 40' laterally. Nowhere was vein in this work more than 2" wide, & generally about $\frac{1}{2}$ " wide. Shipments came from small pockets 15 to 20" that reached a width of 4". A grab sample from ore pile of about 1 T assayed, 0.06 Au, 38.80 Ag & 18.90% Cu. To obtain 1 t approximately 16 times its bulk would be moved. _____





I visited the Haist property. Needless to say, they are highly incensed at the supervising engineer of the RFC. I tried to smooth things out but it was hopeless. Mrs. Haist had gone to Phoenix, and had been called in to see Mr. Gohring, but she was so mad she refused to do so.

Meanwhile, Haist has found some outside help and is getting the property in shape to do some work. He did not care to have me look at it until the work had been done, and is not intending to ask the aid of the department until he is ready to go.

In all fairness, and after some investigation, I believe Bill was justified in turning the property down. The only mistake he made was in telling them he was approving the application (this is their story) asking them for costs, approving them, and then apparently turning the whole thing down. Perhaps they are mistaken. I hope so. But it has left a nasty feeling in the district.

I am enclosing the Haist file, and hope there will be a different atmosphere before we take any part in the matter again.





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

My dear Sam:

I am transmitting to you herewith copies of two replies sent to me on July 2 and July 10 by Honorable Charles B. Henderson, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, with regard to a development loan application submitted to the RFC by Mr. James E. Haist, a resident of Patagonia, Arizona. I am also attaching a copy of a supplemental communication addressed to me on July 17 by Mrs. James E. Haist of Patagonia.

The original application submitted by Mr. Haist to the RFC asked for a loan of \$10,000 for the development of mining property owned by Mr. Haist near Patagonia. You will observe that this application was rejected. Later I wrote to Mr. Henderson again and asked whether he believed that favorable consideration could be given to another application for a Class C loan of \$5,000 if Mr. Haist were to submit such a request. He replied that a further review of the facts presented in connection with the original application indicated that no favorable consideration could be given to an application for a lesser amount.

I have discussed this case with Mr. William C. Broadgate, and he has suggested to me that it might be well if I were to present this correspondence to you for consideration with a view to determining whether Mr. Haist's


mining claims might be examined by a field engineer of the Arizona State Department of Mineral Resources. It is my idea that if such an investigation reveals that there is justification for an expenditure of funds on this property with the hope of developing some worthwhile ore, then I can make a further effort to bring about favorable consideration of a new Class C application by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

I shall deeply appreciate anything you may be able to do to be helpful to Mr. and Mrs. James E. Haist in this matter.

Dear Senator Hayden:

This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of June 27, 1942 requesting information on the status of the application filed by Mr. J. E. Haist of Patagonia, Arizona for a Reconstruction Finance Corporation mining loan in the amount of \$10,000.

A careful study has been made of the application and supporting documents, together with the report of the Supervising Engineer based upon a field examination. We regret to state that favorable action was not recommended because based upon the information submitted by the applicant, together with that contained in the Supervising Engineer's report, it is our opinion that such a loan would not result in the production of a substantial quantity of copper as an aid to the Government of the United States in its War Program.


This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of July 6, 1942, in which you refer to the loan application submitted by Mr. J. E. Haist, Patagonia, Arizona.

The Mining Section advises me that Mr. Haist's application for a development loan in the amount of \$10,000, together with the report of the Supervising Engineer who examined the property in question, has been carefully reviewed. A study of this data indicates that there is no geological evidence from the surface exposures or shallow workings that additional work would result in the development of substantial quantities of ore, and that the work contemplated by Mr. Haist would be prospecting, a purpose for which neither development loans nor preliminary development loans are being made.

Dear Senator Hayden:

Upon returning from Phoenix I found your letter saying the R.F.C. had denied us the loan asked for and to say we were terribly disappointed would be putting it far too mildly, for the last thing Mr. Gohring said to us was that he truthfully could send to Washington a very favorable report on our mining property. That in itself does not seem very consistent with the letter from the R.F.C. saying that it was on the information submitted by him that we were turned down on the loan. He even told us to go ahead and find out the cost of everything pertaining to the initial starting for operating the mine, which we did and when shown him he O.K.'d it.

What I can't understand, Senator Hayden, is that that money is supposed to be to help people get started in any kind of profitable business and Lord knows the Government spends enough on different projects which are every bit as much a gamble as ~~mining~~ and we taxpayers are going to pay for them so why not give we little guys a chance or as we heard over the Radio the other evening the R.F.C. does not propose to put the small business man on the Relief Roll. We are not asking for charity, all we want is a little help to get started with every intention of paying the Government back every dime. As our report stated we have already shipped ore from our mine, but we can do no further development work without some assistance. You know yourself, Senator, that nobody, not Mr. Gohring nor the gentlemen from Washington can see under ground as to what is there, but we have proven that there is ore there and darn good ore too for we have shipped 15 or more tons to Douglass and before we got the mine there were eight sacks taken out which brought \$1200, so it is not exactly a prospect, you see.

I think you remember old Mr. George Gross, Senator, he is dead now, but I have often heard him speak of knowing you when you were a kid and was always a very great admirer of yours. Well, he knew this country like a book and was one of the best mining men that was ever known around here, and he always told us to hold onto this property for it was one of the best in the Patagonia Mining District.

I realize that all Washington has to go on are the reports and descriptions that are sent to them, but sometimes it seems to me that they are not interpreted rightly for it is hard way back there to make a decision about something that the people right on the ground can't tell without trying for. I am probably not making myself very coherent, Senator, but my
