
The Court having heard testimony on behalf of all parties and being fully advised in the premises, and the matter being deemed closed and submitted, the Court finds as follows:

All of said claims being located in Township 18 South, Range 19 East, and constituting one Mining Property commonly called the Lone Star Group of Mines.

This will respond to your letter of October 5, 1975 inquiring about the Lone Star Mine in Cochise County.

Enclosed is a copy of Arizona Fluorspar by R. A. Elevatorski and published by the Department of Mineral Resources, which describes general geology of the Lone Star Mine on page 10.

Arizona Bureau of Mines Bulletin 137 published in 1973 and titled "Index of Mining Properties in Cochise County, Arizona" by Stanton B. Keith discloses on page 91 that the Lone Star Mine produced at least 20,000 tons of fluorspar from 1946 throught 1967.

Our records reveal that the mine is owned presently by Fluoride Corporation, Rowan Building, 458 South Spring Street, Los Angeles, California 90013. Send to the attention of Mr. David G. Saunders, Director, Secretary and Attorney at Law.

The mine has been and presently is closed by the Mine Inspector's office because of extremely hazardous conditions. Inquiries about the closure and requirements to reopen the mine should be addressed to the State Mine Inspector, 705 West Wing, Capitol Building, Phoenix, Arizona 35007.

MG WR 8/27/82: Attempted to visit the Lone Star Mine in Cochise County but access was blocked by a locked gate put up by three ranchers in the area. The name and address of one rancher is C. D. Kartchner, Drawer Ax, Benson, AZ 85602. The owner of the Long Star Group, Claims 1-8, is Mr. David G. Saunders, 458 S. Spring St., Los Angles Calif. 90013.

NJN WR 4/27/84: Jim Vacek (c) called seeking a source of green massive floruite. He reported that the Lone Star Mine (file) Cochise County no longer contains any green flourite on the dump, as it has either been bleached or picked over. Access locked gate which forces a rough "back way" to be used.

CJH WR 1/4/85: Don Hearn (c) stated that he is the owner of the Lone Star mine in the Whetstone district, Cochise County. He will be in next week to examine our files. He is trying to interest a purchaser.

There was no one at the Lone Star Fluorspar mine. A number of people, probably specimen hunters, have been digging in dumps and entering the old workings. Some of the signs posted on the property by the former mine inspector are in bad repair. VBD WR 2/23/76

It is said that Mr. and Mrs. Howard Birchfield, Sr., returned recently to the Lone Star fluorspar mine in the Whetstone Mountains. An eviction order was issued by Superior Court and a deputy was dispatched from Benson to serve the papers. The Birchfields refused to accept the papers E and Mrs. Birchfield became so incensed that she drew a pistol on the deputy and Mr. Birchfield procured his rifle and also turned it on the deputy. The deputy somehow talked his way out of the situation and left. A group of law officers returned after dark and arrested both and jailed them in Bisbee. It is said that they are now free under unknown conditions. The owners of theproperty hired a dozer to go to the property, dig a hole and push all buildings and cabins (including Birchfield's trailer) into the hole and bury them. VBD WR 9/30/76

Telephone call from Mr. John Russell, Tempe, Arizona phone 967-4987, to John H. Jett, Director.



He saw so much fluorspar he decided to stake claims and attempt to sell. He stated he researched records at Bisbee Courthouse and could find no record of assessment work since 1980. I suggested he come into our office and learn about various grades of spar and marketing of same.





MINING CONTRACT

THIS MINING CONTRACT is made and entered into on this, the <u>b</u> day of <u>Moteorflow</u>, 197<u>3</u>, by and between H. A. BIRCHFIELD, SR. and DENA BIRCHFIELD, husband and wife, referred to below as "Principals" and FERN C. HANMIL, referred to below as "Contractor".

FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION of the rents, covenants, agreements, payments and royalties provided for below, the Principals and Contractor do hereby covenant and agree that for the term of this Contract, Contractor will conduct mining operations upon the following described mining property situated in Cochise County, Arizona, referred to below as "the premises" and specifically described as follows:

A. Contractor's operations upon the premises are limited to the production of flurospar from the above described mining claim and known as the H & D Mine. Other valuable mineral deposits on those lands, if any, are hereby reserved to the Principals, subject only to the terms and conditions set forth below.

B. Contractor hereby acknowledges that he has inspected the workings, shafts, tunnels and appurtenances existing upon the above described premises, Knows their condition, and accepts the premises in such condition without warranty from the Principals regarding either the condition of such workings or the mineral reserves located upon those premises.

C. This Contract is to continue for one year from the date of its execution by the parties, subject to Contractor's right to renew for an additional year upon the same terms if during the initial one year term Contractor shall have mined not less than _____ tons of saleable quality fluorspar from the premises.

In consideration of this Contract, the Contractor does hereby covenant and agree with Principals that the grant of this Contract shall be subject to the following terms and conditions:

1. Contractor will commence work upon the premises no later than the date this Contract is executed, and work the premises as a reasonably prudent operator in the manner necessary and appropriate to good and economical mining, so as to take out the greatest amount of fluorspar ore possible with due regard to safety, development and preservation of the premises as a workable mine; all work, timbering, construction, and installation of improvements are to be subject to inspection and reasonable approval of any designated representative of the Principals. Unless and until demand for such inspection by Principals, Contractor shall be free to operate such mine pursuant to his own discretion in accordance with the provisions of this paragraph.

2. Contractor will at all times maintain all drifts, tunnels, shafts, winzes, and other workings on the premises thoroughly drained and clear of loose rock and rubbish, and in a safe and secure operating condition, unless prevented from doing so by extraordinary mining casualty, or to maintain at all times and leave the floors of all drifts, crosscuts, and other

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workings in good, even, unobstructed condition, and to stow no waste underground, nor fill any stopes, without the written consent of the Principals or Principals' duly authorized agent.

3. Contractor hereby acknowledges receipt upon the premises of all of the personal property described in the attached Exhibit A, all in good working order except as otherwise noted on such Exhibit A, and agrees to maintain all such personal property, together with any additions placed upon the premises by him during the course of this Centract, in good working order sufficient to conduct workings upon the premises in a workmanlike and safe manner, returning all of the property set forth in the said Exhibit A in good working order at the conclusion of this Contract, normal wear and tear excluded. Any equipment set forth in Exhibit A which is broken or destroyed, requiring replacement, shall be replaced by Contractor with equipment of reasonably comparable kind and quality to that replaced, and subject to Principals' approval.

4. Contractor at all times during his operations under this Contract shall keep in full force and effect a policy issued by the Industrial Commission of Arizona covering the entire liability of Contractor to his employees under the Workmen's Compensation Law of Arizona.

5. During the term of this Contract, Contractor shall post and at all times during the term of the Contract keep posted notices of nonliability of the Principals for labor and material furnished to or in connection with the operation of the premises.

6. Contractor shall do the assessment work for the benefit of Principals on the above described premices for the assessment years during any portion of which this Contract shall be in effect.

7. Contractor will provide access to the premises for Principals, Principals' manager or duly authorized agent and/or representative, at any and all times (a) to enter and visit all parts of the premises and the workings thereon for the purpose of inspection and taking of assay samples, (b) to take samples from any ores awaiting shipment (c) to have surveys made of the workings by Principals' surveyor and assistants whether under or above ground, or both, as often as the Principals, their manager, or any other duly authorized agent for Principals, shall so order, and also furnish to Principals copies of blueprints of all surveys or maps made by the Contractor; and generally to facilitate in every way such inspection, surveys and samplings, as above provided.

8. Contractor will provide to Principals, their manuger or any duly authorized agent, full, true and accurate information with regard to the condition of the workings upon the leaded premises or any part thereof or the quality or character of the mineral therein, and to immediately give Principals notice of any discovery of any commercially exploitable mineral found upon the premises.

9. Contractor hereby assumes all responsibility for and saves Principals harmless from any and all accidents to himself or any of his employees, subcontractors, licensees, agents, associates or visitors, on the property of the Principals, as herein described and to forthwith post and at all times keep posted at the main workings on the premises a conspicuous notice in the mark and on behalf of the Principals, with the name of the Contractor also attached, stating in substance that the premises are being mined by Contractor, an independent contractor, and that the Principals will not be liable for damages on account of any such accident.

I will be the upon the presser effective states for the presides discovery of any other voluble mineral deposit upon the presides Contractor shall have the exclusive right to negotiate with Principals for development of such deposits during the term of this Contract, subject to royalties, prepayments, and conditions of operation mutually satisfactory to the parties. Failure to supplement this Contract to permit development of any other deposits upon the premises by Contractor during the term of this Contract will not preclude Principals from negotiating with third parties for development of such other ore deposits, such subsequent lease or contract to commence on or after the expiration of this Contract.

11. The Contractor shall pay to Principals the sum of \$200.00 per month, commencing ______, 1973, and monthly thereafter throughout the course of this Contract, such payments to constitute rental upon the personal property and equipment owned by Principals and subject to this Contract.

12. Principals will pay to Contractor a royalty in the amount of \$35.00 per ton on all tonnage of ore extracted and sold from the premises. For the purposes of sale only, Principals authorize Contractor to negotiate for and sell the ore produced from the premises at the best available price, but not leas than the going price for ore of like kind and quality in either Tucson, Arizona, or Maricopa County, Arizona, whichever is the greater on the date of sale. In addition, Contractor's royally will be increased by the amount of \$1.00 per ton for each percentile above 705 fluorspar content which any given shipment of ore is determined to contain by assay. Contractor shall remit the proceeds of sale to Principals' agent together with a duplicate bill of lading for all ore shipped from the mine site, accompanied

SUMMARY

Fluorite occurs in a vein in a faulted quartz-sericite schist. Past production from FL = 0 R I T Ethe mine was over 20,000 tons. The p roperty may have further potential for fitthe itsine production but could not be sampled because of unsafe conditions underground.

The property was examined on March 10, 1975 by Glen Walker and William Hirt.

LOCATION

The mine is in the NW/NE/NE of section 35, T13s, R19e, in Cochise County,

Arizona. It is in the eastern foothills of the Whetstone Mountains in the Coronado Nat-

ional Forest. The nearest town is Benson, Arizona, 15 miles to the northwest.

PHYSICAL FEATURES

Hilly desert terrain with sparse desert vegetation surrounds the mine. Annual precipitation is about 15 inches. Only a small water supply is available at the mine site. Electrical power is available at State Highway 90 about 2 miles to the east.

HISTORY

The deposit was discovered in 1946. Mining from 1946-1987 has producte at least 20,000 tons of fluorspar (Keith, 1973), which would make the mine the largest fluorspar producer in Arizona. The mine is presently inactive.

OWNERSHIP

The ownership could not be definitely determined due to a lawsuit in progress.

GEOLOGY

This is a vein deposit which strikes northwest occurring in a fault in a contorted quartz-sericite schist. The vein could not be traced on the surface to the northwest of the open cut. To the southeast can be seen some veins, but they consist of quartz with no fluorite. Little alteration was seen in the open cut. Quartz appears to be teh main impurity.

According to an earlier an earlier report (Elevatorski, 1971) the ore shoots average 2-1/2 wide by 25 feet long by 35 feet high. Fluorspar seen on the dumps is colorless, white, or light green crystalline.

A sample of ore sampled at the mine by Elevatorski ran 87% CaF₂, 2.7% silica, and 0.13% Pb.

DEVELOPMENT

Access to the ore was gained by means of in inclined shaft 400 feet deep and open cut leading into some underground workings. Two smaller shafts were sunk between the main shaft and the open cut. An exploration shaft 25 feet deep was sunk southeast of the main shaft but no development work was done on it. An indeterminate length of underground workings also exists, but was not measured or mapped because of safety reasons.

At the time of the examination the mine was closed to entry because a man was killed in the mine in 1973 or 1974.

This property is presently in the throes of civil and criminal lawsuits, therefore, there has been no annual work performed for sometime. For this reason it is thought to have reverted to the Bureau of Land Management.

It is located in section 35, T13s, R19e, in Cochise County, Arizona. On USGS 15 minute topographic map, Benson, Arizona the shaft is shown to be at an elevation of 4920 feet and a location of 110° 21'52" Longitude, 31°49'53" Latitude.

The mine is reached from Benson by traveling 4 miles west on I-10 thence south 3-1/2 miles on Arizona highway90 to a gate in the highway fence, through the gate to the right (west) for 1-1/2 miles to the shaft.

Since a fatality in the shaft the State Mine Inspector has closed the mine to any entry.

Stated that information from Royis Ward is wrong. There never was any agreement to lease the property to Royis Ward or Omega Minerals.

In 1972, June or July, shipped several loads of ore (16 tons per load) to Allison Steel at Tempe, from H and D Mine (Lone Star). Allison Steel is now Marathon Steel Co.

In 1967 Mr. Whitelock & Lone Star mine Div. shipped this ore while mine was held up in litigation. Mr. Whitelock had to leave the mine after issue of mandate.

Mine did not run out of ore. Mr. Whitelock had to leave the mine.

Mr. Whitelock never made any settlement of the ore he and his company mined (or machinery removed) during litigation to the appeals court.

In 1967, Mr. H. A. Birchfield was the owner of the mine and it was called H and D mine, not Lone Star (changed in 1964).





<u>Proposed</u> <u>Plans</u>: To resume activities again after the legal difficulties have been settled. Shipments to Kaiser Steel Corp. are being considered when operations are resumed.

WHETSTUNE DISTRICT

The Lone Star mine is at the eastern base of the Whetstone Mountains, 11 miles by road from Curtiss siding. This deposit remained undiscovered -8-

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until 1946. It was mined by Cooper Shapley, Jr., until early 1950 and now is being worked by Pepperdine Foundation. Shipments have amounted to approximately 5,400 tons, valued at more than \$100,000; thus the mine already ranks as the largest single producer of Fluorspar in Arizona. The mine-run spar averaged 85 per cent in effective calcium fluoride content, with only 0.02 per cent silica in the coarse and 2.7 per cent silica in the fines. It has been shipped, after screening, to Pittsburgh, Chicago, and Fontana.

The vein occurs in pre-Cambrian schist, overlain on the west by Paleozoic sedimentary beds and intruded 1/4 mile north of the mine by a stock of muscovite granite. One-half mile east of the mine, a north-ward-trending fault with vertical displacement of more than 3,000 feet brings limestone against the schist.

The fissure containing the vein appears to be of shear type. It has an average strike of approximately north 30 degrees west, but with numerous sharp bends, and shows evidence of horizontal as well as vertical displacement.

Spar shoots in the vein average 27 feet wide and range up to 25 feet long by 30 feet high. Exceptionally they attain widths of 10 or 12 feet. The spar is mainly coarse grained, banded, and greenish.

An inclined shaft 154 feet deep, connects with the workings. Water, encountered at 125 feet, amounts to 2,500 gallons per day.

The shaft is now being deepened, and a washing plant to turn out ceramic spar is contemplated; its market value at present would amount to \$40 per ton at the mine.

Location: The main shaft is in Sec. 35, T18S, R19E.

Owner: Mr. C. Thiercof, J. Marcil of Los Angeles

<u>Operator</u>: C. L. Whitelock and others are forming a company to operate. The mailing address is Box 698, Benson, Arizona 85602.

Work Planned: The mine has been pumped out and the mining of fluorspar is supposed to start soon. At the present time Mr. Peverill and other of the company organizers are doing the work.

Workings: The main inclined shaft is inclined about 75 degrees to the east. It is about 300' deep and has levels at the 100', 165', 250' and 300' stations.

Note: Mr. Peverill whose address is Box 698, Benson 85602, stated that they had a market for the fluorspar and hoped to be in production soon.

Claims: Four unpatented.

COCHISE

Mine visit. Lone Star (H & D) mine and field interview with Mr. Birchfield Sr. and Mrs. Gabriel Camara. Mr. Birchfield is working to reassemble the hoist that was reportedly stolen and to dewater the shaft so as to get the mine operating. Mr. Birchfield stated that he has a contract with Marathon Steel Company for 20 tons of fluorspar a month, but none has been shipped for two months. Several tons of ore are sitting in a loading hopper. The material in the hopper appears to contain considerable dirt and sand. When the hoist is restored, lights installed and the shaft dewatered, Mr. Birchfield plans to operate the underground mine. Mrs. Camara said that our file on the Lone Star (H & D) mine should contain a copy of the mandate issued by the Arizona Supreme Court. Mandate number is 9061-PR. KAP Report of April 19, 20, 1973

Visited the Lone Stare Mine west of Benson. Someone living at the mine; appears to be some work going on. No one was around. GWI WR 12/6/73

There appears to be a lived in mining camp at the Lone Star mine. GO WR 3-29-74

The Whetstone Mountain area mining was apparently limited to assessment work at the Copper Plate mine and the Lone Star. At the latter property mining being done in defiance of the mine inspector's orders resulted in a fatality. GWI AR 73-74

Telephone call from Mrs. M.E. Fischer, (805) 256-3553, Star Route #1, Box 44, Rosamond, California, 93560, who has purchased the Lone Star mine from the Birchfields and is leasing it back to them; wanted to know about mine reports. I told her what was available, but suggested that the best information on the mine would be from a Thesis by Burnet. GWI WR 9/30/74

Telephone call to Mrs. M.E. Eischer to caution her and suggest that she be sure of the court records involving the Lone Star Fluorspar mine near Benson. GWI WR 10/1/74

Went to the Lone Star mine about 12 miles SW of Benson. Here the collar of the shaft is nailed down and an Arizona State Mine Inspector's notice Not to Enter. GW WR 1/17/75

Went to the Lone Star mine 16 miles \mathbf{k} of Benson. Here the vein is contained in a schist which strikes N35-50E and dips an average of 60°SE. The vein strikes N35W and dips stapely(?) NE. About 35 feet from the north end of **a** stope the vein changes strike to N75W due to a N35°E striking fault. The only spar apparent was 18" in a small pillar at the entrance to the north stope. About 260 feet SE of the main shaft which is reported to be 450 feet deep, is a 10 foot shaft with a 3 foot quartz breccia vein but no spar. In the vicinity of the stope north of the main shaft the schist is altered considerably to mainly sericite. GW WR 3/10/75

Mr. Gabriel M. Camara, 3918 W State Avenue, Phoenix - works for Nuclear Corp. of America phone at work 272-1341, ext. 284 was in the office and stated that they have located the Lone Star fluorspar mine near Benson. 1-31-64

Gabriel Camara, stated that he was in partnership with H. Birchfield/under the name of Desert Mining Co., that they were working the Lone Star mine near Benson and had shipped 22 tons of fluorspar to Allison Steel. He said that Kaiser Steel were interested but wanted more information about the mine and ore reserves in same. ALJ WR 2-10-64

Gabriel Camara, 3918 West State Ave., Phoenix told engineer that the Lone Star Mine was closed down on April 10 on account of legal difficulties. ALJ WR 4-27-64

Mr. Tate (M. L. (Tex), Ponderosa Development Co., Box 4800 N, Tucson asked for information on the Lone Star Mine (fluorspar) near Benson. Mr. Tate says his company has an option to lease the Lone Star Mine. ALJ WR 9-21-64

Mr. M. L. Tate, Tucson, reported that the Lone Star Fluorspar mine is still under litigation. ALJ WR 5-15-65

It was reported that Lone Star Mine near Benson shipped a load of fluorite - will check later. GWI WR 5-6-67

Visited the Lone Star Fluorspar mine - Frank Otero in charge - operating. GWI WR 9-3-67

Lone Star Mines Division plans to start mining operations in the state according to C. L. Whitelock, company president. The first project contemplated by the company is the development and production of fluorspar.

The company has acquired the rights to the Lone Star mine located at the base of the Whetstone Mountains near Benson and expects to be in full operation by July 1967 Whitelock said. He estimated that the first years production will approximate 12,000 tons. E&MJ June 1967 p. 246

The Lone Star Fluorspar mine in the Whetstone district of Cochise County, Arizona has made several shipments of fluorspar to the Kaiser Steel Company. Production comes from the 100, 250 and bottom or 300 foot levels. C. L. Whitelock of Benson, Arizona heads the operating group. Pay Dirt 11-17-67
