

GENTLEMEN:

*One Million
Dollar
Donation*

After many months of thoughtful consideration of the interests of the Stockholders of the Central Copper Company and to show my confidence in them and my personal appreciation for their continued loyalty and co-operation, I herewith propose to donate to the Stockholders of the Central Copper Company of Arizona One Million (\$1,000,000) Dollars according to the plan herewith proposed.

The co-operative principles as expressed by the plans of the Central Copper Company for the benefit of the wage earners and low salaried people, are developing with this, as well as other corporations. Our pionëering on this plan has presented ideas not generally understood by the public and, as a result thereof, precipitated opposition and enmity from individuals and the press purely because of their lack of understanding of the facts and principles involved.

*Benefit of
Wage Earners*

The method and principles upon which the Central Copper Company of Arizona was organized and financed were original and unique, being the first one in the United States in that line to prove what the principles and fundamentals of co-operation for the benefit of wage earners would be.

The second step is now being made in the form of a proposal to donate One Million (\$1,000,000) Dollars as shown herewith by the president of the company as an individual to the stockholders in and for their individual and collective financial benefit.

THIS IS THE FIRST SUCH DONATION IN THE HISTORY OF AMERICAN BUSINESS TO THE STOCKHOLDERS OF ANY COMPANY, JUST AS THE CENTRAL COPPER COMPANY IS THE FIRST LARGE COMPANY IN A PROFITABLE INDUSTRY TO BE FINANCED AND OWNED ENTIRELY BY WAGE EARNERS AND LOW SALARIED PEOPLE, EACH ONE OWNING BUT A SMALL NUMBER OF SHARES.

My personal desire is to benefit in every possible way the wage earning and low salaried people and prove, by results, that

"IT CAN BE DONE."

\$500,000 INTEREST

The form of the donation proposed is:

*Form of
Donation*

First: I will detach a total of interest coupons amounting to Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000) Dollars now attached to Eight Hundred and Thirty-three Thousand, Three Hundred and Thirty-three Dollars and Thirty-three Cents (\$833,333.33) of the 10 year, 6% Gold Notes of the Central Copper Company, which are now owned and held by me. These detached coupons will be presented for cancellation and deposited in the treasury of the said Central Copper Company of Arizona for the benefit of its stockholders.

\$500,000 NOTES

Second: To further show my interest and desire to co-operate with the stockholders of the Central Copper Company, I will donate to the treasury of the company Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000) Dollars in 10 year, 6% Gold Notes due July 1st, 1934, of the Central Copper Company. These notes to be cancelled.

*What It
Will Do*

This will enable the company to retain its present cash bank balances and eliminate the necessity of paying Fifty Thousand (\$50,000) Dollars per year in interest during the 10-year period over which the notes will run and will further eliminate the paying in cash on or before the date of maturity of the notes, July 1st, 1934, Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000) Dollars, thus removing immediately total cash payment obligations of One Million (\$1,000,000) Dollars upon the terms and conditions, as mentioned herein.

I realize quite fully and want the stockholders to understand that without their continued confidence and co-operation the very splendid results thus far obtained in the financing of their company and the development and equipment of their properties would not have been secured.

Properties
Secured*

Nearly the entire ownership of all the properties of the Mascot Copper Company numbering 56 mining claims, or about 850 acres, has been secured for the stockholders of the Central Copper Company during the last few months. This includes all of the subsidiary corporations owned by the Mascot Copper Company, including the Mascot Townsite and Realty Company, the Mascot and Western Railroad, about 100 buildings already constructed on the properties of the Mascot Copper Company for the accommodation of employees, a general store and power plant, together with other equipment required for the successful operating of the properties now being handled by the Central Copper Company of Arizona.

The donation of Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000) Dollars in interest and Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000) Dollars in notes reduces the liability of the company One Million (\$1,000,000) Dollars of the obligations assumed recently upon the exchange of Mascot stock and bonds for Central notes and stock, whereby the Central acquired nearly all the ownership of the Mascot Copper Company's properties and subsidiary corporations.

Plans are now being originated that should, within another year and possibly within six months remove all of these obligations of the Central Copper Company and put it entirely out of debt with comparably small or perhaps no actual cash payments.

The broader plans made necessary by the ownership of Mascot Copper Company properties have also made advisable a larger program and more extensive plans for preparing for a larger production involving greater expenditures than previously anticipated.

Economy

The opening of new ore bodies and the development of ore bodies previously opened in the combined properties operated and practically owned by the Central Copper Company is now in progress. They are being prepared for economical production in accordance with combined mining engineers' opinion and business management to make the greatest possible dividends and profits for stockholders.

I WILL DEVOTE MY SERVICES TO THE FURTHERING OF YOUR FINANCIAL INTERESTS IN THIS COMPANY AND THE CENTRAL COPPER COMPANY.

Two years ago I thought the time would arrive shortly when the Central Copper Company would be making splendid profits and I would then be able to give attention to my personal interests which had been neglected for many years while concentrating on Central's problems.

There is a period during the growth of all cities when banking and real estate values have doubled almost overnight, and those who participated during such periods of the cities' growth are now numbered among the very wealthy.


Your letter of January 28, 1979 to the U. S. Bureau of Mines, Phoenix has been given to us to answer.
