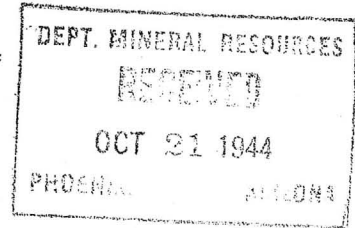
The Quota Committee, with the most expert urging, cannot revise a quota with nothing more than a request for more money, unsupported by factual evidence they need it.

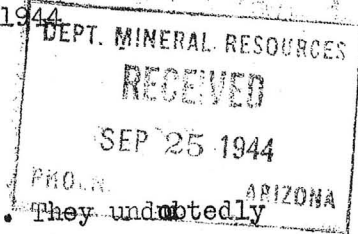

As you know, the WPB does not want any more lead or zinc. They undoubtedly are getting ready to cancel these premiums very soon.

So it is a tough assignment, but will do what I can.

As far as I can see from the letters, Layton has not filed the application forms, nor has he supported his letter request with any bookkeeping.

This will not do at all.

All he will get in answer is a set of forms and request for complete figures proving he needs the premium.

Until these are received, I can do nothing in any case.

He should have you transmit to me duplicates of the forms filed and the data submitted. I cannot understand why people think they only have to ask for \$5.00 per ton with a simple statement they need it for the govt to shell out the money. Send them a copy of my Minerals Report and have them read the premium price section, it will do them more good than anything I know of.
