



Dear Mr. Head:

I want to thank you for your letter of the 16th, and I fully appreciate that there are many who are unable to financially support the continuation of the activities of the Department of Mineral Resources. Just because a person is unable to support it does not mean that we are not going to do our best to give them all the service we can.

I must confess that I do not really know all that is back of the antagonism of the Governor toward the small mines. We do know that he was grossly misinformed, and that he did not take the trouble to make any investigation, but even this cannot account for his bitterness and his desire to do everything possible to harm it. I really think that he has an obsession against the big mines, and he really believes that no matter what there is in the state that is contrary to his small ideas, it is the big mines that influence it. He has even accused the big mines of controlling the Supreme Court simply because they ruled against him on an absurd case.

I have read with interest this morning, your two page circular letter, dated July 15. I fully concur with all you say, and don't think you spoke hard enough about the man who tried so many times to get into the Governorship. I am entirely at a loss to understand his attitude toward the small mines. He must know that the big mines were small and insignificant until developed.

Anyhow I did not support this man in the last election, and I will be on the firing line against him, if he runs again.


And, it may be that I can have a small influence in securing legislation** Major Johnathan H. Michael, now at Fort Benning, Georgia, is my Son-In-law, and he holds the same opinions as I do concerning the Governor.

I am entirely without funds at present, but hope to lend financial aid before long to your plan to carry on and keep up contacts with prospective buyers, until relief can be had through the Legislature.

There is one more thing I want your knowledge on: I see by the news releases that the U. S. Government has an agreement with Mexico, by which the U.S. Govt. will absorb the entire Mexican output of so-called "war Minerals." I want to know how that will affect Mexican mine owners who produce and ship Tungsten, Sheelite, and Antimony? I have a friend in Sinaloa who has a big Tungsten prospect, and last year while he was here looking for financial aid to work the property, nobody would do anything, because of fear of restrictions from the Mexican Government. Do you think that, under the new agreement there will be a chance for my friend to get aid to mine Tungsten for shipment to the U.S. Government? I have contacted the Mexican Consul here, and he says he has no news or instructions whatever. Also I have failed in my inquiries from our Customs Agents at Nogales.

I think I will get off an inquiry to our Consul General in Mexico City, and maybe he can enlighten me on the matter of restrictions.






