

I have just received a memorandum from W. C. Broadgate in Washington and I believe it will not be long before you will have your premiums on the Tombstone Extension on hand, that is, providing you have and can substantiate your statement that the property has been in continued production.



This premium has been signed by Metals Reserve, with the reservation that it is not to be sent out unless Tombstone has been operating continuously.

I hope I didn't lie to Howard Young and Stroble when I told them, based on a recent memo of Coupal's, that the mine is still being operated.

At anyrate, Strobel has wired Brown for confirmation and the tone of his wire will control what happens (Brown's wire).

So, after all this time and so much difficulty, I finally have the case approved all around, and Brown will get his money if the one statement is substantiated. Metals Reserve has to be covered that it is not a straight bailout; and signed with real reluctance.

Incidentally, growing out of my squawks, a hot report which I wrote on the premium price plan and sent to Bunker, and the discussions at our luncheon last week comes a letter from Bunker promising that he will try and keep the total time on premium application processing down to 2 weeks, and a month at the outside if additional data has to be obtained. He is putting in a system of followup where, any case over two weeks old will be brought directly to his attention for checking up. This is an enormous step in the right direction. I always feel badly even when I get these things done, (as in the case of RFC, although we did get more than a year's benefit out of those reforms) because of thinking how much time and money and trouble would have been saved could the reforms have been made effective a couple of years or so ago.

But it takes a long, strong lever to move these agencies, applied slowly and carefully.... first you have to build the lever and then feel around for points of application and be patient at the frequent slips.

I have received the following communications from Broadgate which will let you know the progress being made by him. When you do get anything definite on the subject, I will be very glad to hear from you.

"SUBJECT: Shannon Mine, R. L. Brown

"A letter I received from Brown leads me to think that he believes, because of the Tombstone case, Quota Committee has a prejudice against him, hence his troubles with copper premiums.

"This is not so.

"The Shannon case was turned down because nothing in the application showed it was operating and the Copper Division, following its present policy of not stimulating any operation to begin mining if an investment is necessary, recommended it be not approved.

"On the showing that Brown has been working and that ore is broken in the stopes, I have asked that he be given reconsideration... and I have asked that he be given a good break because of his hard luck on other cases and the fact that I am afraid we cannot get MRC to approve the Tombstone.




Talked to Howard Young about this case this afternoon, as it is a pet of ours, he having agreed to my thesis and set WPB policy on it.


Of course, it requires other approvals yet, but I feel it will go through.

This case and three other lead cases have been the subject of high policy consideration for months, and figure in lots of letters and memos between departmental officials.

If I can put this over (see prior memos) it will lay down a precedent that is going to be hard for WPB and MRC to break.

And you must remember in this case Brown has already stated to WPB that he is going to close from lack of ore anyway. This complicated the case badly and made it more difficult as it is now definately a matter of paying for dead horses.

I can say that in a recent letter from Broadgate on the general situation that he has been getting close cooperation on speeding the special premiums and I know he will follow this up.







Please advise me as to the status of your operations and I will file your labor survey along with your reply.



I enclose copy of letter from R. L. Brown, Tombstone Extension, also a personal record of each man in his employ on this property.

Summarizing his labor data :-

16 men employed.

Refuse to consider going Bisbee or elsewhere.	12
Willing to go elsewhere, IF ORDERED.	4

Those refusing to leave Tombstone, state reasons:-

Due to health or too old.	9
Due to local financial reasons and losses.	3

Statement shows R. L. Brown can obtain sufficient older men and men whose health too poor to stand strain of more forced activity to maintain pace of work in larger mines to justify him preparing to open up a nearby copper.

As in a great manner other small mines, ONE key man handling the job of management can get out a substantial production by the use of labor which would otherwise be idle and which could not be used in the larger mines.

This labor will not be available in such areas as Tombstone for any other type of general war effort employment.





As a matter of fact, Nelson has analyzed some of the files already for me and stated the other day "these cases are even worse than you said they were".



Dear Mr. Brown:

I have just had a memorandum from W. C. Broadgate in Washington with a copy of his telegram of July 27 and some additional comments.

He states, "There is some definite misunderstanding between Brown and the smelter. If he had filed his affidavit he would receive his A premiums. There is no reason why he should not have these while awaiting for the B decision and Metals Reserve will do everything they can in order to get him the money fast the minute the affidavits arrive."

Definite action on the payment of premiums will be taken around August 1 whereby a revolving fund is to be established at each smelter and custom mill and a settlement of 90 percent of the premiums due will be made at the same time that the smelter or custom mill makes settlement on the base price for metals.

This change in method of payment will greatly speed up the premium payments and avoid a lot of useless confusion as you have had to put up with.
