

He suggested that I write in for a list of those seeking properties. If you have one to spare, I would appreciate receiving it.





I have your letter of the 14th enclosing the copy of the Mine Owner's Report regarding your property. I am forwarding this to the Department of Mineral Resources as that is the department which is handling such work.

While your description indicates a very promising property, we cannot be too hopeful about finding people who may be interested at the present time because under present national conditions there is very little demand for gold or silver property. About the only thing that is getting the attention of prospective buyers are the properties of strategic or critical minerals.



One other ore body across the wash from this incline shaft pans for 15 by 25 feet on top of the ground and across six feet, where I expect to sink a shaft, it assays \$10.50 in gold and $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. in silver. This runs across the wash and into the above mentioned vein. A narrow ore shoot close by assays \$14.70 in gold and 12 oz. in silver, often showing blue silver bromide and free gold and silver.


