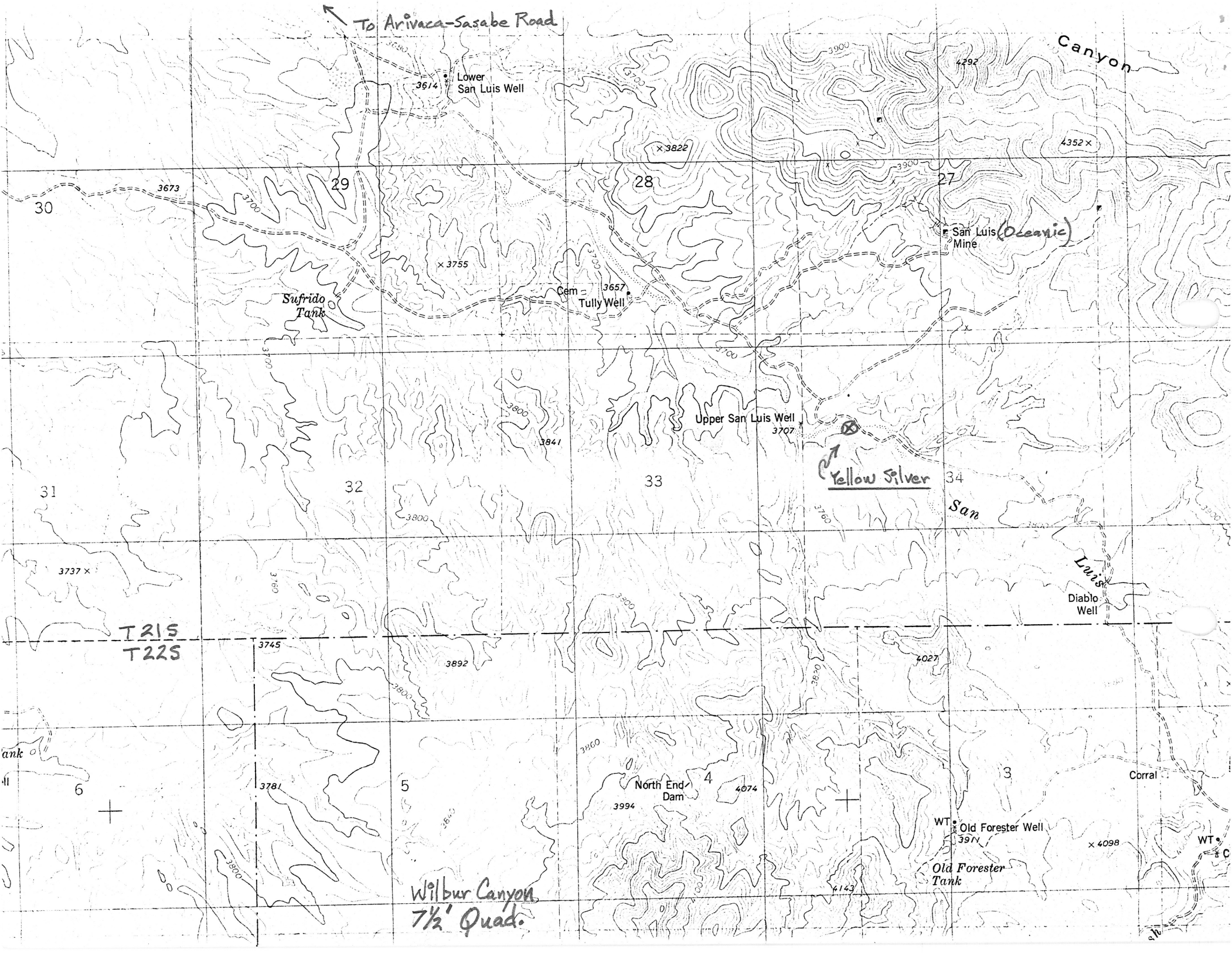

CJH WR 8/21/81: John Whatley, Claimant, Yellow Silver Claim, San Luis District wanted to see if his claim is on the BLM microfiche. It isn't.

MG WR 8/23/83: Mr. and Mrs. John Whatley researched our BLM microfiche. They own the Yellow Silver group of lode claims in Sections 27, 34, T21S R9E, Pima County. The Whatleys report they have leased the property to the Far West Mining Co. of California. I wonder if the Yellow Silver claims conflict with the patented claims comprising the Oceanic Mine property.

CJH WR 7/13/84: John Whatley (c) visited and reported that he had received a notice to appear at the Arizona Commission of Agriculture and Horticulture for violation of the Arizona Native Plant Law. His Yellow Silver placer claims, Arivaca District, Pima County are on federal land, however, six miles of access road are on State land and, apparently, some vegetation was disturbed in re-grading and widening the pre-existing road. Mr. Whatley was informed that the commission would like to be informed of any intended vegetation disturbance, even on federal land. He informed us that the Yellow Silver claims are no longer leased to Paul Holsinger. A lease has been acquired by Martin Alexander and Associates of Salem, Oregon who, reportedly, drilled 100 holes on the property in 1977. When production on the property is attained, concentrates will be put in 30 gal. drums and shipped to Allied Precious Metals Recycling Co., 5657 S. Wilmot Road, Tucson, Arizona Tel: 574-1818. Equipment on the property is owned by a contractor, Amarillo Mining and Milling Co of Amarillo, Texas.

are passed over shaking tables which produce a black-sand concentrate. Most of
the gold is free and is eventually recovered with the magnetite.
A consulting engineer has told me the placer is very low grade, probably less
than 50¢ per ton (when gold is currently selling at \$400/oz).
